We are born unequal—all of us. Not only because of the genes we inherit, but because of our families, our surroundings, the particular corner of the world in which we are born. From the very beginning, we are shaped by differences and marked by inequality. Sometimes they present themselves as opportunities, other times as constraints. They may serve as resources, as foundations of identity that evolve over time, or as chains that hold us back, bonds from which we must struggle to break free.

For the next six months, the exhibition halls of Triennale Milano will be dedicated to the theme of inequality. The focus will extend from cities and spaces to bodies and lives. A series of exhibitions will explore how immense wealth is now concentrated in the hands of a few—and how, for millions around the world, being born into poverty has become an irreversible fate. We will explore how inequality—whether inherited at birth, encountered along the way, or shaped by our own actions—impacts life expectancy and health for each of us. We will speak of ghettos and wars: the most extreme manifestations of inequality, so rigid and profoundly unjust that they become instruments of cruelty, even of death.

But the 24th International Exhibition also makes space for promising ideas, thoughtful policies, and exemplary projects—efforts that, at times, can transform inequality into fertile difference, into shared qualities that enable individuals, though diverse, to exchange values and enrich one another. As we know, the tension—and at times the conflict—between inequality and difference is not confined to today's cities or the vast arenas of geopolitics. It exists within our own bodies and those of the people around us, in the bodies of all living beings, where inherent diversities can become either fertile differences or tragic inequalities.

With Inequalities, Triennale does not claim to have exhausted the subject, but—as it has always done—seeks instead to offer food for thought and to propose possible solutions. Reflections and ideas on the inequalities we inherit, those we encounter, and those we help shape over the course of our lives. Inequalities that we sometimes endure and at other times succeed in transforming into advantages, offered to others as a gift, as added value in their lives.

Throughout history, inequalities have never remained fixed in time or space. They are dynamic and multifaceted, deeply shaping the life trajectories of individuals, families, and communities on a global scale. Understanding these shifts is vital for addressing the social challenges of the future. Academic research serves as the foundational starting point, offering theories, hypotheses, frameworks, data, analytical tools, and perspectives to inform public discourse and guide policy decisions.

The geography of inequality is particularly pronounced in urban settings, where most of the world's population resides. Globalized metropolises are highly diverse, marked by intersecting and multifaceted forms of inequality. Milan is no exception—it stands as a quintessential example of the challenges, opportunities, and divisions that define urban societies and economies. This is why the research and work conducted by the Social Inclusion Lab at Università Bocconi—which underpin the *Milan*. Paradoxes and Opportunities exhibition—offer vivid portrayals of an unequal city. These maps highlight indicators that measure disparities in terms of accessing opportunities.

Inequalities also have intergenerational effects: the place of birth and the socioeconomic conditions of the family of origin significantly shape the futures of individuals and their descendants. In Italy, social mobility is currently among the lowest in Europe, hindering young people's ability to forge independent futures.

Research and history both demonstrate that inequalities can be alleviated through effective policies and collective action. Investing in education, lowering barriers to labor market access, and improving urban infrastructure and housing availability are strategies that can help narrow these divides. Data-driven research is not merely a reflection of reality; it is a tool for transforming it. Across time and space, data reveals the complexity of a system in which each indicator—from population density to employment rates—compels us to question conventional interpretations and consider innovative approaches.

As an academic institution, Bocconi is dedicated to generating knowledge that benefits society, offering tools for rigorous analysis and fostering debate on practical solutions. We believe that inequality maps should not merely serve as representations; they must guide us toward a fairer city, a more just world, and a more inclusive future for the generations to come.

The 24th International Exhibition, *Inequalities*, is a particularly effective project through which to confront the urgent challenges of our time. We live in an era marked by heartbreaking inequalities—both between and within countries—that fuel injustice, polarization, and social tension. These disparities are linked to a growing number of men and women living in extreme poverty. If we define poverty as an income of less than \$5.50 a day, nearly 3 billion people find themselves in this dire situation. As a result, the majority of the world's population faces the risk of exclusion and marginalization. This issue extends beyond the economic realm, impacting the social sphere with consequences for access not only to food and water, but also to healthcare and education. For many, the inability to access these basic resources is a direct affront to their personal dignity. These challenges underscore the deep limitations of the current dominant economic and geopolitical model.

More than any other, the language of art has the unique ability to capture aspects that are often imperceptible to the human eye. This is why art holds such a regenerative power: it addresses universal questions, shapes our consciences, and pushes us toward new perspectives. Pope Francis echoes this idea when he reflects on the role of artists, describing them as "guardians of beauty," capable of "bending down to the world's wounds."

The Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore has long been dedicated to addressing the issue of inequality. Among its many initiatives, I would like to highlight its *Africa Plan*. This program, aligned with the university's policy of global engagement, seeks to develop educational plans in collaboration *with* Africa, rather than *for* Africa. The question of intergenerational alliance is also crucial, offering a valuable lens through which to address issues of longevity and active aging. Italy is the oldest country in Europe, yet the quality of aging is both poor and unequal. However, longevity can be transformed into a resource by promoting forms of active aging.

These are areas where I believe a collaboration between the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore and Triennale Milano holds great promise, both for the city and beyond.

MIILAN PARADOXES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Seble Woldeghiorghis

The United Nations estimates that by 2050, 70% of the world's population—some 6.5 billion people—will live in large urban areas. As cities become the primary hubs of economic, cultural and social life, they will play an increasingly important role in shaping the future of humanity.

Given these projections, it is evident that major international metropolises—with their ability to attract people and resources—will serve as ideal laboratories for testing innovative solutions to global challenges. From climate change and sustainability to social inclusion, technological innovation, smart mobility, and the transformation of urban spaces, these cities are at the forefront of shaping the future. As urban populations continue to grow, cities must develop cutting-edge infrastructure, inclusive policies, and advanced technologies to ensure a high quality of life for all. In doing so, they will confront critical questions about the future of urban living.

What policies and projects should be developed to combine economic growth and social inclusion? What are the priorities for the future of urban communities? How can we tackle inequalities and the growing gap

between wealth and poverty? How can we return to being a center of opportunity for all and not just for a small part of the population?

Milan, like many other contemporary metropolises, is called upon to answer these questions and imagine a new future, developing truly inclusive and innovative practices that go beyond telling stories and reproposing already known and widely practiced models and paradigms. As part of the 24th International Exhibition, Triennale has chosen to focus on Milan—an Italian metropolis with a global outlook—renowned for its ability to anticipate trends and embrace cutting-edge artistic, technological, entrepreneurial, and social innovations. Today, however, the city faces complex challenges that are testing its resilience on multiple fronts.

In fact, economic and social disparities have widened dramatically in recent years, resulting in an increasingly fragmented urban structure. This has given rise to a complex situation in which opposing trends coexist, creating real paradoxes that affect access to opportunities and influence the fate of an ever-growing share of the population.

On the one hand, Milan is an aging city, but on the other it continues to attract young people from all over Italy and abroad, thanks in part to a wide range of university education and advanced training. Incomes have risen in the city center but declined in the suburbs, where rent increases have been more pronounced than in central areas. While voter turnout in municipal elections has declined overall, civic engagement has increased in many neighborhoods through associations and volunteer initiatives. Furthermore, the number of single-person households is growing, and they now constitute the majority, while families with two or more children are increasingly leaving the city.

The focus on Milan aims to explore these paradoxes, examining the city's contradictions to challenge seemingly irreversible trends. This in-depth study, titled *Milan. Paradoxes and Opportunities*, reflects the belief that it is only by courageously confronting major issues that new policies and projects can be conceived, ultimately reaffirming Milan's role as a space of genuine social and cultural integration.

Milan. Paradoxes and Opportunities is structured in two parts: one within the exhibition spaces of Palazzo dell'Arte and another that is external and itinerant. Though seemingly distinct, these two approaches are united by the belief that diversity of perspectives, languages, and voices is a vital strength in driving innovation and urban development.

The first section will be hosted at Cuore – Centro Studi, Archivi, Ricerca at Triennale Milano, a space inaugurated in 2024 and accessible to the public free of charge, and will focus on presenting data on inequalities in Milan. Our partner for analyzing the main urban trends is Università Bocconi, which, through the SI Lab (Social Inclusion Lab), monitors social inclusion and inequality indicators in Milan. Thanks to the research carried out by the SI Lab, based on careful data collection and analysis, visitors will be offered an overview of six great paradoxes that characterize Milan, with the aim of stimulating reflection and starting a conversation about differences. The research and data analysis were conducted by Alessandra Casarico, Chiara Serra, and Felix Eychmüller.

Alongside the data processed by the SI Lab, visitors will also be offered an artistic interpretation by Black History Months Milano, a non-profit association that promotes Italian artists of African descent. Thanks to the diverse skills present within the association, the paradoxes identified by Università Bocconi will be translated into works of art created by six artists.

The inclusion of Italian artists of foreign origin not only highlights emerging talent but also reflects a commitment to recognizing the skills and perspectives of new Italian citizens. Milan, long a crossroads of global knowledge, has embraced its cosmopolitan identity as a catalyst for groundbreaking projects. The curatorial direction is led by Damiano Gullì, curator for Contemporary Art and Public Program at Triennale Milano, and Jermay Michael Gabriel, artist and director of Black History Months Milano.

Meanwhile, the second part of *Milan. Paradoxes and Opportunities* will be developed across the city and will focus on the relationship with local communities, with a presence in different neighborhoods. A mobile unit will be used to approach, listen to and engage students and teachers by organizing educational workshops specifically designed to address the issue of inequality in a participatory way. The main target audience of the project are young Milanese between the ages of 3 and 18, together with their families and teachers. The project will not remain external to the Expo, but aims to involve a wide and diverse audience, promoting access to culture and contributing to the development of tomorrow's audience. This project is in partnership with Fondazione Cariplo.

The exhibition space for *Milan. Paradoxes and Opportunities* and the concept and design of the mobile unit will be developed by orizzontale, a collective of professionals whose work ranges from architecture to landscape, public art, and self-build projects. Their work focuses particularly on emerging social needs and the enhancement of contemporary public spaces.

Milan. Paradoxes and Opportunities ultimately takes shape as a vast, living, and relational archive, a project that not only analyzes the challenges and contradictions of Milan but also proposes itself as a place for dialogue, collective creation, and continuous hybridization. Through the interaction of data, art, and community, the project stimulates deep reflection on the future of our cities and the need to innovate them in an inclusive, responsible, and courageous way. It is only through dialogue, mutual listening, and shared action that we will be able to turn paradoxes into real opportunities for all, restoring Milan—and all major metropolises—to a central role in shaping a future of sustainable and inclusive economic growth.

Mapping Inequalities to Understand and Transform Them.

A Journey through the Contradictions of Milan, Where Center and Periphery Intertwine between Economic Growth, Social Gaps and New Challenges for Inclusion

What Is the SI Lab

The Social Inclusion Lab (financed by the project MUSA – PNRR) brings together researchers from different disciplines—economics, sociology, law, political science—who contribute diverse approaches and methodologies to the study of inequalities and the development of policy to address it. At the SI Lab, we are committed to researching and addressing inequalities through data-driven analysis and institutional collaborations. Our goal is to generate insights that can drive an improvement in our communities.

We do it in two ways. On the one hand, we collect and monitor indicators of inequality at the local level, with a special attention to the Milanese context, and we work closely with institutions to develop

solutions that promote equity and inclusion. On the other hand, we develop scientific projects that share the goal of identifying new data to study inequality, the focus on disadvantaged groups, and the interest in identifying effective policies. We study trust and exposure to diversity, the presence of biases in hiring, the impact of job counseling on vocational students and that of orientation programs in schools on students' aspirations. By integrating quantitative analysis, experimental methods, field studies, and legal expertise, these interdisciplinary collaborations allow for a more comprehensive understanding of exclusion dynamics and the development of evidence-based strategies to foster inclusion.

Understanding Inequality: Monitoring Local Indicators

Inequalities in opportunities are at the root of inequalities in living conditions. The disparities in areas such as education, employment, and healthcare shape the opportunities available to future generations. The context in which individuals grow up has a crucial role in influencing their life trajectories, often reinforcing the existing inequalities.

While inequality is often discussed at a national or global level, our research highlights that disparities also exist within countries and within cities. Neighborhoods only a few kilometers apart can offer different levels of access to education, economic opportunities, healthcare and cultural services. And the demographic fabric of each of them can vary a lot one from the other. Understanding and addressing local inequalities is essential for fostering a fairer society.

Our Approach: Building a Neighborhood-Level Inequality Database

To gain a comprehensive understanding of local inequalities, we are developing a neighborhood-level database that integrates both hard data and subjective ones on perceptions about inequality. We have limited systematic evidence at the local level on how inequalities in access to various services shape perceptions of inclusion and opportunity, and how they, in turn, influence trust and altruism toward others.

Our current focus is Milan. We collect and analyze data on economic conditions, educational access, healthcare availability, quality of the environment, public services, and cultural or sport provision, as indicators of opportunities residents of different neighborhoods have access to.

Why Mapping Inequality Matters

By mapping disparities from different angles, we can better understand the root causes of inequality, guide resource distribution and identify areas where targeted interventions can be effective.

Here collaboration with institutions and local stakeholders is key to turn data into meaningful change, ensuring that all communities, regardless of their location, have access to opportunities that enable them to thrive.

What Do Maps Tell Us?

We certainly have the intuition that not all the neighborhoods in Milan are the same, but to what extent, and in what dimension and, more importantly, with what implications?

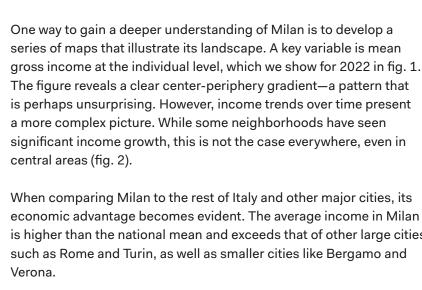

is higher than the national mean and exceeds that of other large cities such as Rome and Turin, as well as smaller cities like Bergamo and A closer look at Milan's neighborhoods further illustrates these

disparities. The top 1% of the income distribution is concentrated in Brera, while at the other end of the spectrum, Roserio has an average income comparable to that of Messina. Meanwhile, a resident in Lorenteggio earns an income that aligns with the Italian national average.

However, Milan's higher average income also comes with greater inequality. Even within individual neighborhoods, income disparities remain significant, suggesting that economic differences exist not just across neighborhoods but also within them.

Income is only one aspect of Milan's socioeconomic landscape, and it is the starting point for the identification of relevant contrasts and opportunities. Within the Milan. Paradox and Opportunities exhibition, hosted in the Spazio Cuore of Triennale Milano, Si Lab has focused on inequalities in Milan, in line with the broader theme of the 24th International Exhibition, highlighting some of the contradictions that shape the city. Milan, a city known for its dynamism and rapid transformation, is experiencing a series of contrasts that highlight its evolving social and economic landscape. These paradoxes/contrasts reveal how different neighborhoods of the city are developing in unexpected ways, creating a complex urban environment. We have selected some contrasts to guide the visitors through the exhibition and trigger some individual and collective reflections on the city. Our selection focuses on some of the key themes shaping the city's future: housing, families, generations, education, access to green spaces, and civic and political participation.

Decreasing Incomes vs. Rising Rents

Over the past decade, incomes have grown more significantly in the city center than in the outskirts. However, housing costs tell a different story. While it would be reasonable to expect that rents rise more where incomes increase (fig. 2), Milan defies this logic: rents in more peripheral neighborhoods have increased in real terms at a faster rate than those in the central areas. In some cases, rents have even increased in areas where incomes have declined, creating a growing affordability crisis for residents in these neighborhoods. For instance, between 2014 and 2023, real rents per square meter increased by 42.4% in Umbria-Molise-Calvairate and decreased by 14.7% in Guastalla (fig. 3).

The Disappearance of Large Families

Milan is becoming a city of individuals rather than families. Households with two or more children are gradually disappearing, as economic pressures and lifestyle changes make it increasingly difficult for larger families to remain in the city. While almost 15 years ago they were concentrated in the peripheral areas of the town, in the most recent data available their share in the population of households has declined (fig. 4). In Cascina Merlata, 39.7% of all families were large families in 2011, while none is left in 2021 according to the census data. Single-person households have become widespread across all neighborhoods. And these single households are not only of one type, as they comprise both single households with young and with old individuals.

A Growing Elderly Population and More Young Adults

Indeed, another relevant demographic shift in Milan is the simultaneous increase in two seemingly opposite age groups: the elderly and young adults. Every district of the city is seeing a rise in residents over 65, a reflection of an aging population. Yet, Milan is also witnessing a growth in the number of young people aged 18 to 25, suggesting that the city remains an attractive hub for students and young professionals. Their needs are however different from those of the elderly population, driving a different demand of public services.

Education: Middle Schools Everywhere, High Schools Concentrated

Education is at the core of public intervention. While middle schools are rather evenly distributed across all of Milan's neighborhoods, thus ensuring that kids have relatively equal access to education at this level, high schools are concentrated in the more central areas of the city (Guastalla, with 20 high schools in the latest available year; fig. 5). By contrast, there are no high schools in 47 neighborhoods (i.e., more than 53% of them), meaning that students from peripheral neighborhoods must travel for their secondary education. This uneven distribution of educational opportunities could be seen as a disadvantage, yet it also favors interaction among students from diverse backgrounds, enriching the social and cultural exchange within Milan.

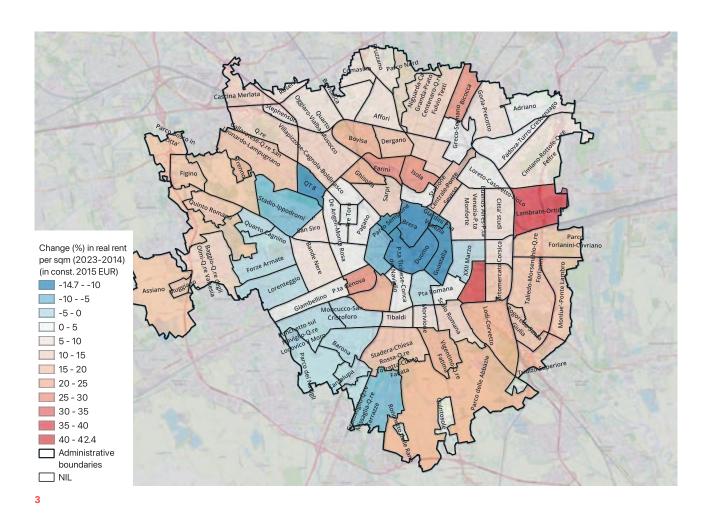
Green Spaces: There Are Some But the Accessibility Is Not Uniform

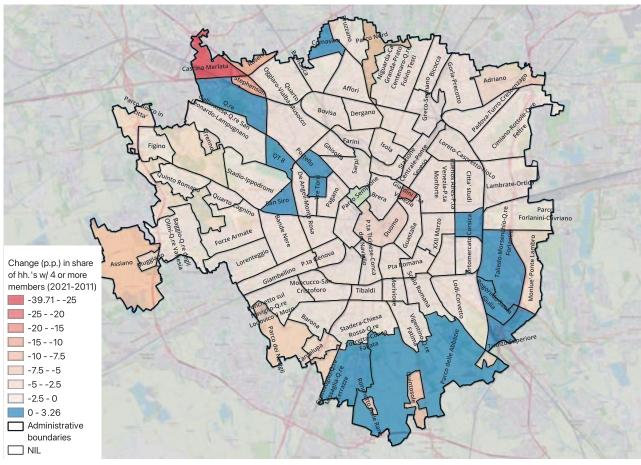
Milan has a rather even distribution of green spaces, but access to large parks is uneven. While many residents can reach one within a 15-minute walk, central and surrounding districts often lack proximity (fig. 6). This is crucial as trees and green areas help reduce urban heat by providing shade, reflecting solar radiation, and releasing moisture. Data shows that areas near large parks are cooler, underscoring the need for better access to green spaces citywide.

Rising Civic Engagement, but Declining Political Participation

Social and cultural exchange is also a driving force behind the increasing engagement of Milan citizens in civic life, as reflected by the growing number of registered associations and community initiatives across the city. This surge in civic engagement highlights the city's rich social capital and the willingness of residents to

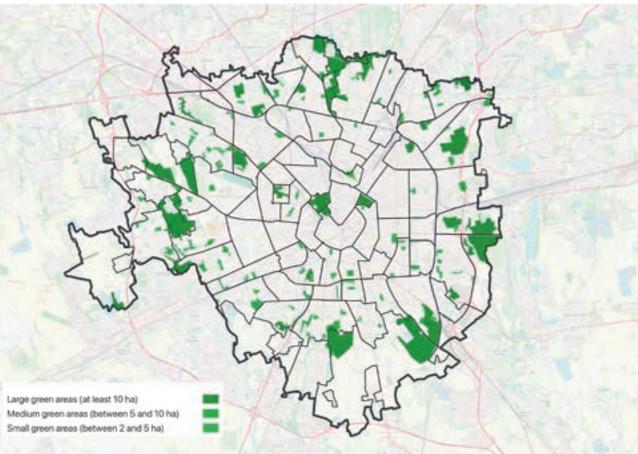
- 3 Percentage change in mean rents per square meter by neighborhood, 2023–2014 (in constant prices, 2015). Source: Real Estate Market Observatory

contribute to their communities. However, this trend contrasts sharply with a decline in political participation. Voter turnout for municipal elections has dropped in all neighborhoods, pointing to a estrangement from political processes, even when local activism increases.

REPRESENTING COMPLEXITY

Damiano Gullì, Jermay Michael Gabriel

In 1954, Luciano Berio and Bruno Maderna created Ritratto di città at the RAI studios in Milan. This experimental radio drama is a poetic and revolutionary sound work in which concrete and electronic sounds, prepared piano, fragments of recordings, and the voice of Cathy Berberian blend with the texts of Roberto Leydi to form an original acoustic portrait of the city of Milan. It marked the start of the Studio di Fonologia Musicale in Milan, a seminal moment for research into new forms of sound and music expression in Italy.

But how can we "portray" Milan today, given its complex, ever-evolving social and economic dynamics, especially when considering the inequalities that shape and permeate the city?

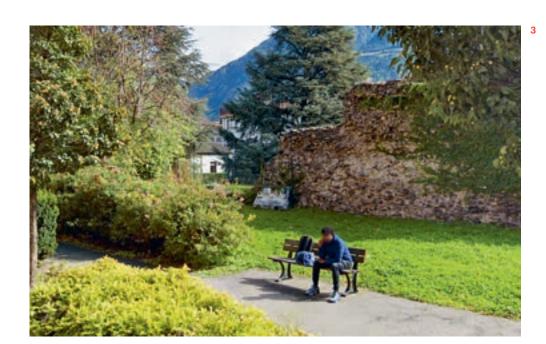
The challenge facing this exhibition is to convey this complexity through an open, inclusive, and cross-disciplinary approach. It has involved the collaboration of the SI Lab at the Università Bocconi, Black History Months Milano (BHMM),1 and, for the exhibition design, the architects' collective orizzontale.

- 2 Délio Jasse, Untitled, 2025, Van Dyke brown print and screen print on fabric

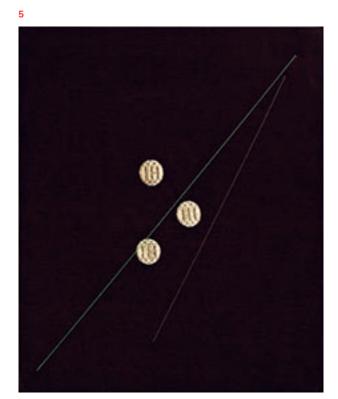

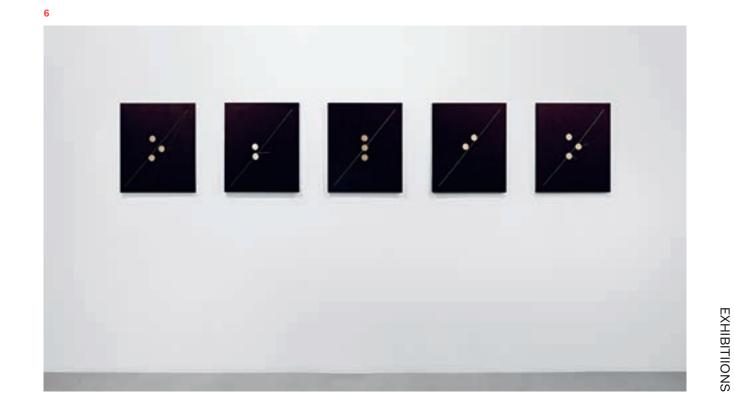

Starting from a series of Milan-related data collected and analyzed by the SI Lab, six macro themes/keywords were identified—Living, Families, Demographics, Education, Participation, Green—and six artists were associated with them—Justin Randolph Thompson, Theophilus Imani, Muna Mussie, Délio Jasse, Leyla Degan, and Jim C. Nedd. They were identified in collaboration with Black History Months Milano (BHMM) and invited to offer a personal and idiosyncratic reinterpretation and artistic rendition. The interplay between data and the artists' visions throughout the exhibition creates a "crossover" where seemingly opposing perspectives—the "cold" and rigorous scientific approach and the "warm" artistic vision—converge. This reciprocal narrative counterpoint enriches and broadens interpretations of the city's paradoxes and opportunities, encouraging reflections and actions aimed at rethinking its future.

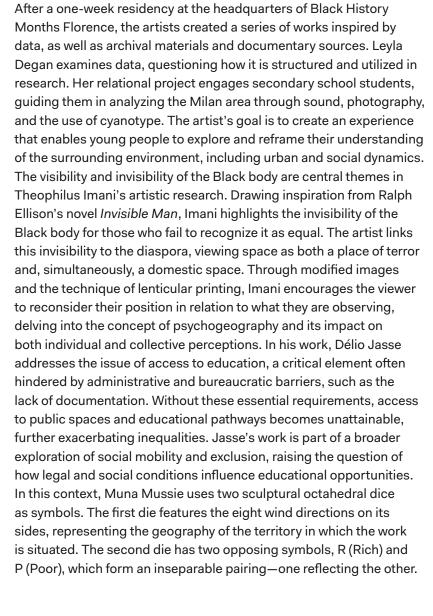
BHMM is a non-profit association committed to the study, research, promotion, and production of Afro, Afro-descendant, Black, and African cultures. BHMM's mission is to create an environment where "blackness" is not just an identity or label, but a fundamental creative and cultural force. Through transnational exchanges between Afro-descendant cultures, the association seeks to establish a network of collaboration and dialogue between the Black and African diasporas in Italy and worldwide, aligning with Milan's cosmopolitan tradition. The need to tell the story of Black people, in all its complexity, has led BHMM to engage in a debate about the very definition of "blackness." As a result, the association's Statute includes a variety of terms—Afro-African, Black, and Afrodescendant—to represent the diverse experiences and identities within the global Black community. Blackness is not seen as a monolithic concept but as a fluid construction, shaped by the historical and geographical contexts in which it evolves. BHMM's activities include organizing events, conferences, workshops, and artist residencies focused on highlighting the sociocultural contributions of people of African descent. These initiatives have a strong educational component and aim to raise public awareness of intersectionality, as well as the significance of Black communities in both history and contemporary society.

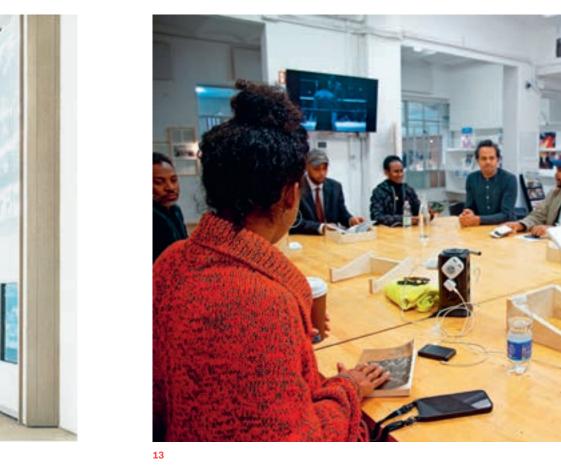


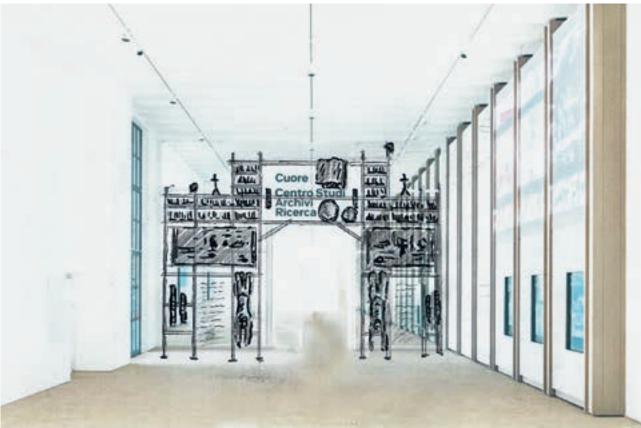

Their existence is paradoxically based on a "sick alliance" of mutual support, highlighting the complex relationship between wealth and poverty. On the second die, only one side appears free of markingsthough in reality, it is marked with Braille, offering an invitation to engage with the piece beyond the sense of sight. This subtle detail challenges rigid classifications, encouraging a more flexible, nuanced interpretation. The "emptiness" of one face of the die questions the rigid relationship between the individual/community and the system of social, economic, geographical, and emotional policies we navigate. Jim C. Nedd tackles the issue of civic participation and local elections by drawing attention to the "invisibility" and "hypervisibility" of Black artists in Europe, shedding light on the complex dynamics of representation and recognition. In his work on display, Nedd chose to eliminate the human figure to avoid the monumentalization and fetishization of the Black body. His approach emphasizes a mode of representation that avoids visual stereotypes. Lastly, Justin Randolph Thompson's research centers on dismantling colonial dynamics and advocating for the freedom of self-determination, both personally and artistically. Thompson explores the concept of "adaptation" imposed by society and examines how, through art, individuals can break free from these societal constraints. For example, by referencing hair, Thompson describes how conforming to imposed aesthetic and cultural models can become an invisible prison. His art serves as an act of awareness and choice, challenging and reinterpreting colonial conventions while breaking the cycle of appropriation and adaptation. These artistic and intellectual contributions collectively foster a deeper, global debate on the paradoxes and opportunities offered by the city of Milan.

Triennale on Tou

TRIENNALE ON TOUR

Triennale on Tour is a project within the framework of *Inequalities*, part of 24th Triennale Milano International Exhibition. It brings Triennale to the neighborhoods of Milan, aiming to deepen and enrich the research developed for the *Paradoxes and Opportunities* exhibition. This initiative focuses on listening, raising awareness, and actively involving the city in its exploration.

The exhibition, hosted at Triennale's Cuore – Centro Studi, Archivi, Ricerca, focuses on mapping inequalities by highlighting the paradoxes and contradictions that define Milan, with the goal of envisioning new policies and projects for social and cultural integration. In parallel, *Triennale on Tour* will embark on a participatory journey between June and July 2025. A mobile unit will visit eight municipal districts across Milan, offering initiatives, activities, and meetings for children, teenagers, and families in collaboration with local partners.

Triennale on Tour is part of a broader reflection on Triennale's role as a cultural institution that prioritizes audience engagement, aiming to expand and diversify its reach. The project focuses on engaging

center. Aligned with the theme of *Inequalities*, the initiative seeks to foster cultural engagement among children, teenagers, and families in the Milan area. By enhancing their creative potential and encouraging socialization and collaboration, the project activates multidisciplinary practices and introduces new formats for cultural experiences. *Triennale on Tour* is based on a co-design approach guided and stimulated by dialogue between the institution, the communities involved, and partners such as Associazione Coi Ludosofici, Associazione Lilliput, Codici Ricerca e Intervento, ABCittà Società Cooperativa Sociale, Cascina Biblioteca cooperativa sociale, Associazione socio culturale Sunugal / CIQ - Centro Internazionale di Quartiere, ATIR e Biblioteca Chiesa Rossa, Villaggio Barona, Consorzio Cooperative Lavoratori / Zoia Officine Creative, Mitades, Associazione Porta Moneta.

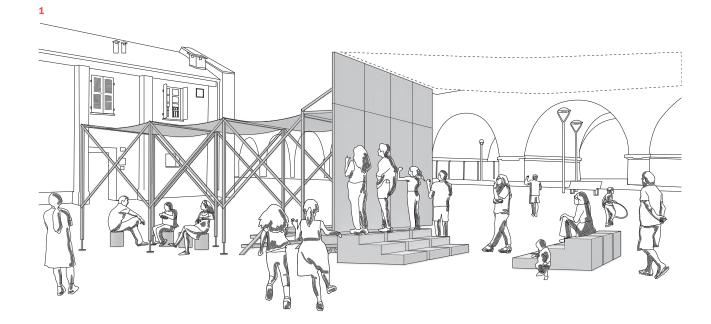
The conception and design of the mobile system, which integrates

The conception and design of the mobile system, which integrates various functions, has been entrusted to the orizzontale collective, whose work focuses on emerging social needs and the enhancement of contemporary public spaces. The *Triennale on Tour* program will see each municipality host the project for three consecutive days. During these stays, the following activities will be offered: a workshop designed by Triennale in collaboration with the local partner, tailored to meet the specific needs of each community (with activities for children divided into three age groups: 3–5 years, 6–11 years, and 12–18 years); a continuous, free-admission activity designed by orizzontale for families and local audiences; and a moment of listening and sharing aimed at supporting and enhancing existing programming in the area, including the presentation of live performances.

At the conclusion of the activities in each area, to further strengthen the connection with the institution, the communities engaged will be invited to complete the experience with a free visit to Triennale's 24th International Exhibition.

Triennale on Tour has been developed with the contribution of the Fondazione Cariplo and is part of a wider project that sees Triennale Milano involved in the presentation of the Fondazione Cariplo's Second Inequality Report.
